Remarkable Relations: The Story of the Pearsall Smith Family by Barbara Strachey. This account of the Pearsall Smith family is beautifully written in a vigorous, direct style, with a candour and detachment which does honour to the author's Quaker ancestors, but with an irony and freedom from piety which owe something to her Bloomsbury upbringing. A masterpiece of intensely readable descriptive writing.



The Letters of Claudio Monteverdi, ed. Denis Stevens. This excellently edited and annotated book illustrates vividly the status of composers in Counter-Reformation Italy. Monteverdi was a very famous composer in his lifetime, yet even allowing for the genuflections from clients to patrons obligatory in his day, his constant and pathetic pleas to the Dukes of Mantua and Venetian officials for money and position still read painfully. It took the French Revolution and the Romantic movement to create a climate in which Verdi could be a Senator of the Kingdom of Italy.
